Select 10 spellings to learn each week. <p>Use the look, say, cover, write and check method to learn them.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 2. Write a sentence using each word. 3. Write a definition for each of your 10 words. <p>It will also be beneficial to revise the spelling rules that we have looked at previously in class. Check your old spelling lists for these words.</p>	<p>Please keep a diary daily, you should include the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Date in full - Monday 22nd June 2020. b. Climate – mention the temperature, weather, wind speeds etc. c. A news item of interest - watch Newsround or the daily news to help you. Work has been assigned on there for you to complete. All of the work is consolidation and revision of what you have already done in class. Go on 'Numbergym' – you should know your password – enter web address, click on online access tab and then add Crowmoor and maths4me then select your game and add your password</p> <p>4. BBC Bitesize Primary https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/levels/zbr9wmn is a good website to practice your maths.</p>	<p>Science – Plants</p> <p>1. Grow your own cress. Can you test the best growing conditions for cress? Think about what factors you can change e.g. light, temperature or the amount of water. (See the instructions below)</p> <p><u>PSHE and Wellbeing</u></p> <p>1) Watch the short story https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8WiOUWLeT9I</p> <p>What is the moral of the story? A moral is the lesson of the story e.g. forgiveness, fair play. Think of a time when you were kind to someone. How did this make you feel? Has there been a time you have shown kindness to somebody? How do you think that made them feel?</p> <p><u>Kindness at home</u> – choose 5 or more kind gestures you can do for someone. (You will find a document with ideas on our class page)</p>	<p>1. During the next fortnight, we would like you to try and learn some new life skills! This can be anything from learning to tie your shoe laces to telling the time. Maybe you could set the table ready for tea time? Be creative but use the time wisely to practise those skills that you normally struggle with. It might be learning how to plait your hair (if your hair has grown anything like mine has, then this is a good opportunity 😊) or learning how to care for a plant. Be imaginative!</p> <p>2. We would normally be having Sports Day around this time. We would like you to create your own Sports Day in your garden. You will need to have a running race, an egg and spoon race, an obstacle race and a skipping race! Dress in your normal sports day kit (coloured t-shirt which is your school house colour). Take photos and send them to hazel@crowmoorschool.co.uk and I will try and put some of them on our class page on the website!</p> <p>3. Using your Language Nut login (Mrs Martin gave them to you just before we finished). Have a look at the section on 'Food' and practise your vocabulary. 





CRESS HEADS

Wondering what to do with all those leftover egg shells from your boiled eggs and omelettes? Look no further...

YOU WILL NEED

Egg shells
Water
Tissue or Cotton Wool
Cress seeds

WHAT TO DO

1. First, prepare your eggshells. When you're cooking and eating them, try to crack them towards the top, leaving as much as possible un-cracked at the bottom. That way you get a more head-shaped bit of egg to play with. Now carefully clean the inside out if there are any egg bits left inside.
2. Cut the tissue up into small squares so that you can put it inside the egg without cracking the shell. It's even easier to use cotton wool as it won't need cutting. Fill the egg up to about 1cm below the rim of the egg shell.
3. Moisten the tissue/cotton wool thoroughly – right the way through.
4. Cover tissue/cotton wool with a layer of seeds (not more than one seed thick!). Place the eggs in the light. And don't forget to water them when they get dry.
5. Once the seeds have started growing, draw a funny face onto the shells and watch as the cress hair grows.
6. When the cress is fully grown, you can chop it off and use it in egg sandwiches... (Or try Jamie Oliver's 'Potatoes, Avocado and Cress Salad' – you can look it up online!)
